

Overview

In 2022, New Mexico experienced the worst wildfire season in recorded history. The consequences of such large and devastating wildfires in New Mexico results in the increased vulnerability of the exposed lands to seasonal rains, triggering flash flooding and debris flows. This flooding was particularly devastating due to proximity to population centers, burn severity, steepness of terrain and size of the areas burned. This compounding disaster led to further degradation of the forest lands and caused irreparable damage to local homes, vegetation, streams, and wildlife.

During this time, the Emergency Action Fund was reactivated to support the affected communities. In 2022, over \$100,000 was granted to nonprofits providing emergency and basic human needs services. Now, as these communities begin the process of rebuilding, the remaining funding will be available to support in long-term recovery efforts.

Focus Areas

This RFP is intended support long-term recovery efforts in the following areas as communities work to rebuild. The Emergency Action fund seeks proposals from organizations addressing **housing stability and support**, **access to economic opportunities and/or environmental restoration and reforestation**.

- Housing Stability & Support may include, but is not limited to: supporting individuals and/or families in rebuilding and/or repairing homes affected by the wildfires
- Access to Economic Opportunities may include, but is not limited to: innovative income opportunities for individuals and/or families whose primary source of income was lost due to the wildfires
- Environmental Restoration & Reforestation may include, but is not limited to: intentional efforts directly supporting the environmental preservation, restoration and/or prevention of impacted lands

What You Need to Know:

- Organizations must hold 501c3 nonprofit status from the IRS.
- Organizations may only submit one application.
- Organizations that have already received a grant from the Emergency Action Fund in the first round of funding are eligible to apply.
- Grants will range in award size, based on the scope of the work and available funding. Exact grant amounts will be determined during the application review process.
- There is \$180,000 total available in funding across all three focus areas.
- This application will be considered separate from any other grant application submitted to participating funders. No information provided in this request will influence any additional funding decisions the partner funders may be considering from your organization this year.
- Applications may be submitted for programs that are currently underway, but not completed. Funding may be used retroactively for partial programming.
- Applications must be submitted by April 14, 2023.
- Funding decisions will be announced May 9, 2023.
- The EAF partners may share your request with other entities to increase access for more available funding.

Narrative:

While organizations are required to submit an online application here, the following bullets indicate information which will be required in various questions on the application.

- A brief description of your organization.
- Description of program for which you are applying for funds (this should include the need for the program, the population who will benefit, approximate number of people impacted and the goals of the program).
- How your program fits into one (or more) of the above-described funding areas. A stronger application will show how your program fits into multiple funding areas.
- Description for measuring and evaluating the impact(s) of your program.
- How your organization is representative of the community that you are serving.
- How you are collaborating sharing talent and resources with other organizations in community. *Collaboration is not a requirement for funding.*
- A detailed project budget indicating the intended use of grant funds and budget justification.
